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BOAT AND WATER SAFETY

Boating Education Requirement

Anyone born on or after December 31, 1986, must successfully complete an approved boating education course before operating a motorboat. The course is available on the DNR website. Click on boating under the Law Enforcement heading.

Wear Your Life Jacket

Personal flotation devices are not just for wearing in boats and not just for those who can't swim. Make sure the PFD is in good condition and fits properly. Youth 12 years or younger must wear a PFD if they are on deck while a motorboat is moving.

Wading

There are several rules you should follow for safe wading.

- Wade with a fishing buddy
- Wear your PFD
- Find out whether the bottom is rocky or muddy
- Shuffle your feet or probe with a stick along the bottom to avoid holes
- Study how swiftly the water is moving
- Wear appropriate foot wear (considering water temperature and bottom substrate)



Person in Water

Reach-Throw-Row-Go is a method of rescuing a person who is in trouble in water.



If the person is close to you, **REACH** out with a long object such as an oar or tree limb to pull the person into shore or the boat.



If you can't reach the person, then **THROW** them a life-saving device, like a ring buoy or throw cushion. If possible, it should be tied to the end of a line so you can pull the person to you. An inflatable ball or foam cooler can be used if the proper device is not available.



If there is nothing to throw, **ROW** a boat to the person in trouble. The person should be pulled in over the stern, or back of the boat, if possible to prevent the boat from tipping over. If the boat has a motor, it must be shut off before you get to the person in the water.



GO (swim) to the person only as a last resort and only if you have had life-saving training. People who are drowning often panic and injure or drown someone trying to rescue them. Then call 911 if necessary.

Fishing in Cold Weather

Hypothermia is a life-threatening condition in which your body loses heat faster than it can produce it. A common misconception is that the air or water temperature must be below freezing before you can become hypothermic. Any water colder than 70 degrees can cause hypothermia. Symptoms include uncontrollable shivering, fumbling hands, slow speech, confusion and exhaustion. In the case of an emergency, get the victim out of the cold, give them warm drinks, keep them awake, remove all wet clothing and get them into dry clothes.

To stay warm, wear several layers of clothing. Air trapped between the layers serves as insulation. A wool hat prevents heat loss from your head. Fishing is difficult with most gloves, but lightweight rubber gloves, gloves without fingertips and gloves that have a flap to expose your fingers allow greater manual dexterity.

Special Regulation Areas

District 4 has special regulation areas for trout, bass, walleye and other species. These may include catch-and-release, fly fishing only, delayed harvest and slot limits. For information about special regulations, please check the current Fishing Regulations booklet, as these may change each year. The booklet also provides a description of each area's location and how to access it.

ANGLER'S ALERT

Spread of Unwanted Organisms

Moving live fish or other aquatic animals and plants from one body of water to another can cause long-term damage to the ecological stability of lakes and streams and can threaten recreational fishing. Please take these precautions to prevent problems.

• do not move fish from one body of water to another

• drain live wells thoroughly before leaving an access area

• do not release live baitfish or aquarium fish into West Virginia's waters

• remove all visible plants and animals from your boat, motor, trailer, nets and all fishing gear before leaving an access area

Fishing and Boating Access Sites

Public boating and fishing access facilities shall be used solely for the purpose of launching and retrieving watercraft or fishing from the shore. No other use of the access sites is allowed.

After launching, vehicles shall be parked in available parking spaces.

Any law enforcement officer acting under proper authority may prohibit an individual from launching a watercraft from any public boating and fishing access site.

The following are prohibited at fishing and boating access sites:

- consumption of alcoholic beverages or possession of an open container of alcoholic beverages
- swimming or bathing
- camping
- open fires
- trash disposal except where trash receptacles are provided
- discharge of firearms, fireworks or explosives
- leaving unattended watercraft
- commercial use except as authorized by the director
- parking of any vehicle or the mooring of any watercraft in such a manner as to obstruct any avenue of ingress or egress, except for the purpose of launching

Anthony Creek: Greenbrier	W-F: from 1 mile below Big Draft Run upstream 13 miles to Neola.
Big Clear Creek: Greenbrier	BW-F: from Kessler upstream 11.5 miles along WV Secondary Route 1 to Clearco.
Camp Creek: Mercer	BW: from the entrance of Camp Creek State Forest upstream 4 miles.
Clear Fork: McDowell	M: from Meathouse Branch downstream 4 miles to Wilmore Dam. Access is provided by U.S. Route 52 near Clear Fork Junction by an old railroad grade.
Clear Fork: Wyoming	 BW: from the first bridge above the mouth on state secondary Route 6 near Simon, upstream 5 miles to the golf course. DH: 1.2-mile section from the Wildlife Management Area manager's residence downstream to the state Route 6 bridge from Nov. 1 to May 15.
Dry Fork: McDowell	M: from Canebrake upstream 4 miles to within 0.5 mile of the Virginia line. State Route 9 parallels to stream.
Dunloup Creek: Fayette	M: from the mouth upstream 3.5 miles to Harvey. Access via WV Secondary Route 25 from Glen Jean.
East River of New River: Mercer	BW: from 1 mile below Kelleysville upstream 6 miles to near Hardy. State Route 112 follows the stream for most of the stocked section while state secondary Route 460/3 provides access downstream of Oakvale.
Glade Creek (Babcock): Fayette	BW: from Manns Creek upstream through Babcock State Park 3.5 miles to Sidenstricker Branch outside Landisburg.
Glade Creek of New River: Raleigh	BW-F: in a 0.5-mile section at the WV Secondary Route 27 crossing and from below Glade Springs Resort to the upper end of the catch & release area, 3 miles above the mouth.
Howard Creek: Greenbrier	MJ: under general regulations, upstream section in White Sulphur Springs, Greenbrier Ave. to Mill Hill Drive, and lower section from the Route 63 bridge at Caldwell upstream to a location near Wendy's.
Indian Creek of New River: Summers	M: in a 3-mile section from the mouth upstream to WV Secondary Route 33/2 bridge near Indian Mills. Stocked section is within Bluestone Lake Wildlife Management Area.

Marsh Fork: Raleigh	M: from the WV Secondary Route 13 bridge, upstream of Arnett, downstream to Dry Creek. State Route 3 follows the stream for nearly all the stocked portion.
Mash Fork: Mercer	BW-Q: from Camp Creek upstream 2.5 miles
Meadow Creek: Greenbrier	M: from the bridge at Correctional Center upstream 6 miles to near Lake Sherwood. State secondary Routes 14 and 14/1 follow the stream.
Meadow Creek: Summers	M: from the railroad bridge near Claypool, downstream 3.5 miles to the mouth at the Meadow Creek post office.
Mill Creek: Fayette	M: from WV Secondary Route 5 bridge, near Ames Heights, downstream to within 0.5 mile of New River outside Ansted.
North Fork of Cherry River: Greenbrier, Nicholas	 BW: from 0.25 mile above the catch & release area upstream 9.25 miles along WV Route 39 to bridge near Carpenter Run. CR: 1.67-mile section near Richwood.
Paint Creek: Fayette, Kanawha	BW: from the mouth of Milburn Creek upstream to Pax. DH: from Ash Branch upstream 12.5 miles to Milburn Creek.
Panther Creek: McDowell	M: 4.5 miles within the Panther State Forest boundaries.

Rich Creek: Monroe	M: three miles from Peterstown, upstream to near the Route 219 bridge.
Second Creek: Greenbrier, Monroe (Fly Fishing Section Only)	CR: 1.5-mile section at Rodgers Mill. Accessible by state secondary Routes 219/3 and 3/7 from U.S. Route 219, approximately 5 miles south of Ronceverte.

Litter Law


It is illegal to dump litter and other waste on public or private property. In addition, it is illegal to throw litter, a fish or animal carcass, or other unsightly matter into a water body or on land within 100 yards of water, or in a location where high water would wash the matter into a water body.
